Emergency Substitute Lesson Plans

Approximate Time: 30 minutes

Social Studies Skill: Building Civic Dispositions

Success Criteria: Students will reflect on the importance of kindness by drawing a picture.

Materials:

- » copies of Kindness in My Community worksheet (page 4) for each student
- » copies of **Comic Strip** template (page 5) for those who finish early
- » art supplies such as crayons, colored pencils, and markers

Kindness in My Community

- Remind students that a community is a group of people. A community is anywhere students live, work, or play. Many communities value kindness, both being kind to people within and outside their communities. Remind students that they may already give and receive kindness from people they know and who are safe. If they would like to interact with people they do not know, they should do so with help from a trusted adult, like a parent or teacher.
- Discuss examples of kindness with students. Examples might include
 - » helping a classmate pick up items that fell from a lunchbox or backpack
 - » sharing with a friend
 - » receiving a compliment about your skills from a coach
- Distribute copies of the Kindness in My Community worksheet to each student, and ensure that each student has their own art supplies or access to classroom art supplies.
- Direct students to think of a time they gave or received kindness. Remind students that kindness can be large or small, but it often makes someone feel better than they did before. If students are able, direct them to write one sentence explaining their pictures. If students are not ready to write a full sentence, they may raise their hand and dictate a response to you.
- Explain that student work should be neat and that it will be graded.
- Students who finish early may wish to create a kindness comic strip using the Comic Strip template. Explain to students who create a comic strip that they should show how an act of kindness led to a change.
- In the last five minutes of class, invite volunteers to share their pictures and explain what they drew.
- Please collect student worksheets and leave them on my desk.
